ANOTHER POST-TROPICAL WHAT?

Public schools were closed most of the week and Halloween delayed as Lordship hunkered down for Super Storm Sandy during the last week of October. Reaching the Lordship shoreline, as a "Post-Tropical Cyclone" which in weather forecasting speak, is code for - fill the generator, cleanout the basement, and call the roofing contractor. Nothing 'Super' about Sandy which left us with flooding of epic proportions, filling basements with seawater, heaved sand around the neighborhood, caused havoc to the Short Beach Golf Course and split open the Sea Wall.



The record-breaking storm surge left Lordship beaches in shambles with varying degrees of flooding and erosion, and still in need of repair and clean-up months after the storm. With the Sikorsky Memorial Airport mostly underwater, including the runway and several hangars, the airport was closed for days and some navigation aids and runway signage still remain inoperative. Some planes were totaled by insurance companies as the corrosive salt water left more than 10 airframes with the fate of needing to be entirely re-skinned, which can exceed beyond their economic value. There was no shortage of sparks generated from downed power lines throughout Stratford, leaving 11,000+ without power, but fortunately they did not ignite flames endangering people or property. Environmentally, Sandy dramatically altered many beaches and other parts of the landscape along Connecticut coastline including sweeping oysters to new locations, potentially killing the shellfish. The extent of damage to shellfish beds caused by the storm surge and the sewage discharges led to a ban on shell fishing in many A full assessment of how Sandy damaged the environment may not be known for months, but destruction on land from ruptured oil tanks, sewage treatment problems, and floating debris into open waters certainly affects the water quality. Beyond property damage, one of the biggest impacts near Lordship from storms like these is on the beaches and the barrier island system, where many shorebirds and other animals depend on for survival. Believe it or not, Lordship has not received a direct hit in recent hurricanes, but it doesn't mean we haven't felt the sting these massive storms leave behind. It would be a refreshing New Year's resolution to not engage in anything 'record-breaking' for 2013, unless, of course, it's referencing a Lordship native capturing acclaim in a Yo-Yo, Juggling, Pole-sitting, or cup-stacking contest. LORDSHIP HISTORY

There have been many stories of Captain William Kidd burying treasure in Lordship between 1698 and 1699. People have searched for his treasure on Lordship's Long Beach (now Pleasure Beach). Point-No-Point (the Seawall) and at Stratford Point. The largest occurred in 1855. The Spiritualists of Bridgeport, Huntington, and Stratford, gathered a hundred or more strong, and dug for thirty days in search of Captain Kidd's gold. The excavation covered several acres in area, and was still visible almost 100 years later. A medium of some note pointed out the locality as the true one, and great faith was placed in her ability to discover hidden treasures. The restriction was placed upon the company that, while they searched, no one should speak above a whisper. This stipulation was rigidly adhered to until the thirtieth day, when one of the party struck another accidentally on the foot with a shovel. The pain was so great that the injured man uttered a terrible oath and the spell was broken. Then all departed silently to their homes, firmly believing that they had been very near to the coveted money. One of the areas that they dug is shown in a 1936 photo at the land on 1005 Prospect Drive. Prospect Drive is named for the prospectors who took the dirt road out to the Point to dig. While digging here in ruins from what legend has was a smuggling warehouse, they discovered tunnels which continually filled with water.



This depression may be the remains of the legendary "Minto" or "Mills" tunnel. Ruins of the great Stratford Point warehouse of the Mils, "Minto" and Nichols families. These great stones may have supported a tunnel two centuries ago. 1936

A second version of the search for buried treasure says the Spiritualists used a wooden pump of Captain Nichols then owner of the Lordship farm. The pump was used to pump out what they call the old "Spiritual Hole" down on the beach by the light-house. The Spiritualists heard that the Bank of England was robbed and the wealth obtained taken aboard a pirate vessel. One of the sailors when on his dying bed confessed the whole business, and said the gold was buried in the Sand bank on Stratford Point, near the light-house. His confidant was a Spiritualist and after the poor fellow had kicked the bucket; his friend consulted the spirits, who told him the money was there yet. A quarter of an acre of land was bought and dug over to a depth of 30 feet. They didn't find the gold, but made an everlasting sight of sport for lookers-on. Every morning a string of Spiritualists from all this and surrounding towns would march in a procession to the shore and begin digging as if for dear life. Not a word was spoken: all directions were given by signs and a stranger would have taken them for a lot of dummies. They had a tent rigged up and hired a man to stay in it to keep watch for thieves, who they had an idea would steal a march on them and lug off their treasure. They hired William Nash and his team to dig for

As a boy once recounted, "The old pump I spoke about was used to draw out the water which filtered in from the Sound. My sakes, how they used to sweat over the old wooden thing. Mother got a notion one day she wanted to see them, so I hitched up the old mare and drove her down. When we came near the Spiritual Hole and tied the mare to a fence post, and we walked to the edge of the bank where they were digging. They were holding a circle, or séance, or something. Mother just then heard a noise behind us and looking around there was the old mare going like likity-split for home: hadn't traveled so fast for 25 years, so we had to foot it home."

A third version comes from Lighthouse Keeper Thede Judson. There was a great hunt for Kidd's money in the fifties (1850s) said Mr. Judson. There was a spiritualist hereabouts and she got a lot of her friends excited over the chance of digging up what the old man had buried. This whole coast has always been a magnet to hunters of pirate treasure. She told her friends that she knew where Kidd had planted his ill-gotten gains. All they need to recover it was to follow her advice. Pointing to a bluff to the westward Mr. Judson said, she decided that the ducats were buried over beyond that bluff. The whole bluff was dug away by the faithful and you can still see evidences of the great treasure hunt that was conducted by the lady's friends and pupils. She went into a trance and the rest dug. They got teams from John Merwin to cart the dirt away. Did they ever get anything? Of course they did not. But the lady explained that. Before they started, she told them that they must follow her directions in every particular and one was that nobody should speak or the spell would be broken. There were those boys digging along that strip of beach for more than a week. When things were getting kind of hopeless something was struck and one of the boys piped up, Thar she is. Whatever it was it sunk into the quicksands. Yes the lady said it was Kidd's gold. This occurrence was unusual and aroused a great deal of attention at the time because students of spiritualism were greatly agitated by an outbreak of ghostly rappings in a Stratford house at the same time that the treasure search was being conducted.

Another legend associated with the diggings involves the cedar pump. Captain Samuel Nichols brought from New York a red or Spanish cedar pump, some say a cedar of Lebanon taken from a Spanish vessel that was being repaired at that port; the pump being old and hence unfit for further service. He set it in his yard on what is now 4th Avenue for watering his cattle at the Lordship farm. After standing there about forty years, it was taken out, somewhat rotten at the lower end, but was afterwards used by the Spiritualists to pump water from the hole at the gold diggings about a mile east from the Lordship farm, near the shore. The old pump was made of two pieces bound together with iron hoops. After a time is was brought to the village and became the property of Nathan McEwen for some work he did in pay. So the old pump, after being transported in active service over the great seas many years, did about sixty years service on land and then although much of the wood was filled with nails, yet Mr. McEwen secured quite a number of beautiful canes from it and thus in parts the old cedar pump travels on.
